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### Seeking the Lord's Face For the Sudanese

Show me what you are doing, Lord, so I can follow You. This is my frequent prayer (c.f. John 5:19). God is clearly at work among the Sudanese, but how I am to serve His purposes? What specifically does He want me to do?

As a result of the time spent in Aweil, Southern Sudan and among the Sudanese at Kakuma Refugee Camp in Kenya I now have many invitations to work with the Sudanese.

In January, 2005, a peace treaty signed by the Khartoum government and representatives of the Sudanese People's Liberation Army/Movement began a period of peace that has lasted for two years in southern Sudan. The Peace Boys Team arrived in Northern Bahr El Jazar during the anniversary of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement. We were able to participate in many celebratory events and to enjoy Sudanese hospitality. I was able to spend more than ten hours with the regional Minister of Health learning about the rebuilding efforts of the Government of Southern Sudan (GOSS), discussing health care, and touring healthcare facilities. As a result of your generous gifts to Uganda/Sudan Medical Mission, I was able to take a quantity of medications to the hospital in Aweil and a local clinic. There is a dearth of medications in this area, so the gift was received with overwhelming thanksgiving. Several people insisted that "thousands of lives would be saved as a result."

The experience at Kakuma Refugee

Camp was quite varied. A little medical care (all participants got dewormed!), a little theology (e.g. looking at healing in the gospels, a review of the minor prophets), teaching on health, and a powerful conference on prayer. I became a member of the Thiec Nyallic (Ask God) Prayer Army. This 800 member strong group of prayer warriors has seen the Lord stop the war, halt violence in the refugee camp, interrupt a cholera epidemic among other acts. They worship through amazing songs and dances that express their abundant

faith and emerging theology. Even their uniforms have significance. Everyone carries a cross. The red shirt symbolizes the blood shed during the war. The black skirt or trousers represents the scorched land. The white over-garment is the light of Christ. I wear my uniform with pride and carry my cross boldly into battle each day!

Thank you for your prayers for this time

spent among the Sudanese. It was a powerful experience that has energized me. I am eager to return to Aweil and Kakuma. I also hope to visit Rumbek and other parts of southern Sudan where I now have many contacts and budding relationships. Please pray with me for guidance about how to proceed; how to see what the Lord is doing and for the faith, boldness, and courage necessary to follow.
